We are pleased to be using the Internet to schedule Parent-Teacher Interviews.

The process for booking interviews is broken into the following steps:

Step 1 – Pre-Register at https://vulcanelementary.schoolsoft.ca

You can set up a Parent Account by following the link above. Click the REGISTER NOW button and complete the registration form. Your login credentials (email and password) will remain in the system to make it easy to access the Conference Manager in the future.

Please note that in order to enhance functionality and security, the Conference Manager requires you to use Internet Explorer 7 (or above), Firefox 3 (or above) or Safari 4 (or above). If you are using an older browser, the Conference Manager will automatically prompt you to update your browser and provide you with a link. This is a one-time process and only takes a couple of minutes.

In order to ensure that your email program does not block emails sent from the Conference Manager, we suggest adding appointments@schoolsoft.ca to your address book.

Step 2 – Conference Manager Opens to Parents – Friday, November 1st at 12:00 PM
You can access the Parent Login Page using the link in the Confirmation Fmail. If you do not receive

If you do not have Internet access, you are welcome to contact the office and we will schedule your conferences on your behalf.

Step 3 – Book your Parent-Teacher interviews

Select the teachers with whom you want to book interviews. You will see each teacher's schedule. After booking your appointments you can print off your schedule. You will also receive an email containing the teacher name, time and location of the conference. You can log into the system at any time to view your bookings, print, cancel or re-schedule appointments. You have the option of submitting comments or questions to the teacher as part of the booking process.

Principal Message

I hope all of you had a great time last night either out with your children or busy answering the door. Thank you to everyone who came out yesterday for our fashion show. The costumes were awesome!

Our latest provincial achievement tests (P.A.T.) results have been released. As many of you know, P.A.T's are provincial standardized tests that are administered to students in Grade Three, Six and Nine in the spring of each year. Students in Grade Three are given a reading, writing and math test and in Grade Six, students write science and social studies, as well. The chart on page two gives a breakdown of how our students did and we are very proud of their results. The scores are broken down into two categories, "acceptable", and "excellent". Basically an acceptable is a pass of over 50% and an excellence is typically over 80%. As you can see, many of our scores are significantly higher than the provincial average; in fact many percentages at our school are double the province. These are tremendous results and credit must be given to the hard work of our students, the efforts of V.P.E. staff and all of your support at home. The academic support you give your child at home pays off! Thanks again to all of you for your continued dedication. Your child's education starts at home and these results are only possible with parents leading the way.

We are also very excited about our "Leader in Me" initiative that we're started at V.P. E.. This program, based upon Stephen Covey's 7 Habits of Highly Effective People, "is an innovative, school wide model that increases teacher effectiveness, student engagement, and academic achievement, while preparing students to be leaders in the 21st century." We have begun to introduce the 7 Habits to your children, so please ask them about Habit 1-Be Proactive. Ideally, we would love to see our students using the 7 Habits in all areas of their lives.

Please take a moment to book a parent teacher interview. They are scheduled for November 5th and November 6th. This is an important piece in the partnership between home and school. A 100% family turnout would be amazing! We welcome everyone to join us for our Remembrance Day service at 10:30 on Thursday, November 7th. Have a great November everyone.




Kindergarten Happenings

Grade 3/4



Kids' Health

Healthy drinks, healthy kids

Children and youth need fluids to prevent dehydration and to stay healthy.

However, what your child drinks can have a big impact on his or her health.

Drinks to choose most often...

- Water: Offer throughout the day. Encourage your children to carry their own water bottle during active play, sports, and on the go. Wash water bottles daily in hot, soapy water.
- Milk or plain fortified soy beverage: Send milk in their lunch or include with breakfast or dinner to help your child get enough protein, calcium, and vitamin D. Kids need two cups (500mL) of milk per day.
- 100-per cent juice: Choose 100-per cent juice and limit juice to a half-cup (125 mL) per day. Ideally, kids should eat their fruit instead of drinking it.

Juice has vitamins and minerals, but is also high in natural sugar. If kids drink too much juice, they may not be hungry for healthy meals and snacks.

Drinks to choose sometimes...

 Flavoured milks or flavoured soy beverage: These drinks have the same bone-building nutrients as milk or fortified soy beverages but also have added sugar.

Drinks to choose least often...

- Drinks with added sugar: Did you know that fruit-flavoured beverages such as 'drinks', 'punches', and '-ades' are made up of mostly sugar and water? Limit drinks that are high in added sugar. Examples of these drinks are sugar-sweetened pop, fruit-flavoured drinks, punches, and ice slushes.
- Specialty waters: These waters often have added sugar, sugar substitutes and herbs. Specialty waters are not recommended for kids.

Make influenza immunization a part of your routine

Influenza season has just begun and is very contagious in the winter months. The influenza immunization should be part of your routine health care.

Here's why:

- The influenza shot is the best protection against respiratory influenza.
- Influenza causes a respiratory illness that can last for seven to 10 days. It does not cause the stomach 'flu' or a
- Children and adults with chronic conditions are at greater

risk for complications of influenza.

- Influenza can account for 2,000 to 8,000 deaths every vear in Canada.
- The influenza shot is available in two forms: Nose spray (Flumist) and injection (Agriflu and Fluviral).
- Flumist requires no needles. Children 2-17years of age and adults afraid of needles should consider this form of immunizations.

Check with your local public health unit for dates and times of flu clinics in your area.
